POLAR BEAR TRACK MEET

Matthews, Kelly Lead Way

ASBURY PARK - Freezing temperatures and icy streets didn't deter 45 chilled trackmen from the swift completion of their appointed rounds in yesterday's third annual City of Asbury Park Polar Bear Track' Carnival.

Milt Matthews, a University of Maryland senior running unattached, and John Kelly, a Millrose A.A. (New York) long distance specialist, turned out to be the swiftest Polar Bears of them all with victories in the meet's two co-featured events.

Matthews, a former Lakewood High School star who now holds the Atlantic Coast Conference 1,000-yard title, outfooted 31 rivals to win the four-mile run

Both races were held on city streets following a shift from the snow covered boardwalk. The athletes covered a circular route that included Asbury Avenue, Main Street, Deal Lake Drive, and Grand Avenue. The runners went two laps, the walkers five laps.

Lt. Reilly Captures Run

ASBURY PARK — Dave Romansky, a 29-year-old Pennsville, N.J. truck driver, and Bill Reilly, a 23-year-old Marine Corps lieutenant from Ocean-port, proved the hardness Polar Bears of them all Sunday.

Just an hour before a snow-storm hit, Romansky and Lt. Reilly won their specialties in the City of Asbury Park's fourth annual Polar Bear Track Car-

nival on the boardwalk. Romansky won the 10-mile walking event in one hour, 15 minutes, 49.5 seconds, good enough for two records.

He erased the boardwalk 10mile standard of 1:21:36 by Bal-timore's Bill Kaiser on Dec.

27, 1965. Lt. Reilly was only 18 seconds off the Polar Bear record for 5,000 meters, covering the boardwalk course in 16:18. The record is 16:00 by Joe Lynch of Highlands two years ago. Thirty-seven athletes trimmed

down to shorts, T-Shirts and long johns for the two-event meet staged with the thermone. eter reading in the low 30's.

Snow, which forced last year's Polar Bear races off the boardwalk and on to adjacent streets. this time held off until the races were over.

"I really pushed for the record," Romansky admitted. "Olympic year starts in just a few hours and I figure that

Despite 20-degree tempera-tures and icy breezes coming off the ocean, the races attracted their largest starting fields in history. Taking part were 15 women, 30 boys 14 and under, 67 men for the 5,-000-meter race, and 31 walkers.

Reilly Leads Boardwalk Mark-Setters

ASBURY PARK — Olympian Bill Reily of Oceanport and Junior Olympians Rick Buckstead of Edison Township and Sheila Fortune of Pennsville set meet records to feature yesterday's eighth annual Polar Bear Track Carnival on the boardwalk.

Outrunning a 75-man field largest in meet history, Reilly captured the men's 3.2-mile race in 15:45.4. The former Long Branch High School and Penn State trackman cut 14.1 seconds off the meet record he established two years ago. The pace was so fast that Shore Athletic Club's Harry Nolan, runner-up in 15:59, also was under Reilly's old record and became only the second man in meet annals to

dip under the 16-minute mark. Buckstad, a student at Herbert Hoover Junior High who already holds the world age 14 record for the 3000-meter steeplechase, stepped off 1.6 miles in 8:11 for another meet mark.

Just 15 yards behind him in 8:14 was another top prodigy of the junior high school set, Chris Hallinan of Bernards-ville. These two are rated among the most promising young runners ever to appear on the New Jersey track scene.

Miss Fortune, representing the South Jersey track Chargers. was clocked in 9:34.8 as she annexed the women's 1.6mile race, taking 1.2 seconds off the mark set last year by Shore AC's Pat Barrett Miss Barrett wasn't in top form yesterday and dropped back to fourth place.

Completing the day's list of winners was Todd Scully, a member of both the All-Army Track Team and the Shore

Athletic Club. He defeated another Olympian, Dave Ro-mansky of the Chargers, as he won the 10-mile walk in 1:19.29. Romansky settled for second in 1:22.

Reilly intends to make a serious bid for a spot on the 1972 Olympic team and his winning form shows that he's rounding into the form necessary to make the grade in the final U.S. trials in July in Eugene, Ore. He'll make a few starts in key indoor season races before brushing up on the steeplechase for the outdoor campaign.

Scully also nurtures Olympic team aspirations and he'll make his own bid in the 20kilometer walk.

In the men's 3.2-mile run. Princeton graduate Hugh Sweeny of Fanwood edged out Princeton sophomore and defending champion Bob Bazley of Long Branch for third piace.

Don Grow of Toms River South placed 14th and was the first high school finisher in the race. Right behind him was Red Bank Catholic's Jim Keiser. Toms River South edged Point Pleasant Beach, 28-31, to win the high school team trophy.

Scholl captures 5-miler

ASBURY PARK — Bill Schoil, the former Brick Township High School and Malone (Ohio) College distance running star, had been a consistent winner of races run on the track, road and cross-country courses for over 12 years. But until yesterday he had never won an event on the boardwalk.

It all changed for Scholl, a 30-year-old Long Branch resident, in the 18th annual City of Asbury Park Polar Bear Track Carnival on the boardwalk, sponsored by Mutual Aid Savings and Loan Association in cooperation with the Shore Athletic Club.

He outdistanced a field of 120, gathered from around the country, to win the featured five-mile run in 24 minutes, 51.1. seconds. It was excellent going in running conditions that weren't. A steady rain made footing difficult and the turns a challenge.

Runnerup Dave Billings of Ocean Grove finished in 25:10 with Harold Nolan of Middletown Township third in 25:47.

"I knew I had to build a lead on the last lap because Billings would be coming back at me," said Scholl. He was right. Billings made a late charge but still wound up 90 yards back.

Nolan triumphs again in 'Polar Bear' run

ASBURY PARK — He did it in 1972, 1973 and 1979. And Harold Nolan did it again Saturday afternoon, in the Polar Bear Track Carnival on the Asbury Park boardwalk that officially rang down the curtain on the Shore running year.

This was the 20th annual holiday footracing event, sponsored by Mutual Aid Savings and Loan Association and staged by Shore Athletic Club. Nolan, of Middletown Township, became a four-time winner with a 24:52.5

performance in the featured five-mile run.

The Polar Bear meet is one of the longestrunning in New Jersey, and Nolan has been part of its history from the beginning. He ran the first Polar Bear race (in 1964, won by John McDonnell, now head track coach at the U. of Arkansas) and he's run in every edition since, even though it required journeys from Utah, Nebraska and New Hampshire in some past years. He's placed in the top three 17 straight years — since 1967, Only 1968 Olympian Bill Reilly can now equal Nolan's Polar Bear victory total of four.

Winning the 1983 event, though, was not easy. For nearly four miles, it was a tight duel between Nolan and Hugh Kuchta, former Wayne State (Mich.) College runner now living in Matawan. But Nolan shifted into high gear

in the stretch drive and won by 50 yards.

Kuchta took second place with Bill Scholl of Manasquan, 1981 Polar Bear winner, third, and Phil Benson of Ocean Township, director of the Asbury Park 10-Kilometer Classic, fourth.

Mary Devlin Milchanowski, Brick Township, was women's winner in 31:34.0.

A five-race program attracted over 200 athletes. A triple trophy winner was Asbury Park High School freshman Keith Pedrick, who took the open 600-yard dash and the boys 12-13-14 mile and a half run, then was second youth finisher in the five-miler.

Ray Funkhouser, Trenton, won the 10mile race walk in 1:14:54, second best winning time in Polar Bear annals. Dave Talcott of Owego, N.Y., the '82 winner, was second in 1:19:31. Cynthia Costa, Long Branch, was first woman walker over the line.

ASBURY PARK — Bryan Pownall and Ray Funkhouser, who plan to compete in the 1988 U.S. Olympic Trials, closed down the 1987 New Jersey racing season in winning style yesterday.

Pownall, a 28-year-old Baltimore resident and former All-America cross-country runner at Miami University of Ohio, ran off with a 24:48.9 victory in the five-mile race at the 24th annual Polar Bear Track Meet on the boardwalk.

Funkhouser, 36, of Toms River, preceded Pownall in the winner's circle with a 1:12:52 triumph in the 10-mile race walk.

Pownall hopes to qualify for the April 24 Olympic Marathon Trial, starting and finishing in Jersey City's Liberty State Park.

Funkhouser has already qualified for the Olympic Trial 20-kilometer race walk, set for Indianapolis in mid-July.

Women's champions were 18-yearold Betsy O'Connor of Rumson, a freshman at the University of South Alabama, with a 33:16.9 clocking in the five-mile run, and Dolores Randazzo of Sea Girt, with a 1:50:42 10mile walk.

The traditional holiday season races were sponsored by Mutual Aid Savings and Loan Association, staged by Shore Athletic Club and attracted over 300 athletes from 14 states.

Pownall succeeded Joe Keenan of Hoboken as Polar Bear five-mile champion and won it convincingly.

Unknown to most of the throng of spectators on the boardwalk, he took an early lead and went on to win by 200 yards over Harold "Mr. Consistency" Nolan of Middletown Township.

Nolan, 40, winner of the TAC National Masters five-kilometer crosscountry championship last month in New York, has competed in all 24 editions of the Polar Bear event.

In one of the most remarkable records in New Jersey sports, he has placed in the top three in 21 of the 24 races.

"I was here visiting my in-laws in Ocean Township and read about this race in the paper yesterday," said Pownall.

He quickly made plans to compete and quickly made it a runaway.

He has 2:14 marathon credentials and won the 1983 Rocket City Marathon in Huntsville, Ala.

Injuries have slowed his progress the last two years but it's obvious now that he's on the comeback trail.

Nolan success goes on

ASBURY PARK — One more chapter has been added to The Harold Nolan Story, one of the the Shore's longest-running success sagas.

As the Asbury Park Polar Bear Track Carnival marked its 25th anniversary on the boardwalk Saturday afternoon as the state's final racing event of 1988, there was Nolan again leading the pack in the featured five-mile run.

At age 41, Nolan continues to both amaze and outrun the younger generation. He scored a decisive 26:33.8 victory in the five-miler, leaving 120 pursuers in their tracks. Nolan has run all 25 of these Shore Athletic Club-staged Polar Bear races and this was his seventh triumph. He's placed in the top three 22 times with nine second places and six thirds.

Just three times — in the first three Polar Bear races, 1964-66 —has Nolan failed to place in the top three. He won his first Polar Bear race in 1972, and won others in 1973, 1979 and 1983-85.

A distant second in 27:27 was Bill Scholl of Manasquan, a former winner (1981) of this race.

In the long-run department, Louise "Lulu" Weschler of Colts Neck Township has a nearly matchless record, too. The Atlantic City Marathon winner last fall at 40, she made a 33:12 performance Saturday, her third Polar Bear victory.

There was a repeat winner in the men's race walk event as well, Ray Funkhouser of Toms River winning for the fourth time in six years with a 1:09:45 clocking over nine miles.

A new winner, though, was Stella Cashman of New York with a 1:27:50 women's walk victory.

Green Brook High School football and basketball star Roger Patin Jr. added to his track credentials, too, by winning the 600-yard dash.

Polar Bear Races still belong to Nolan

ASBURY PARK - The tide comes in and the tide goes out. Runners come and runners go.

But there's only one runner as reliable as the tides and his name is Harold Nolan.

For the eighth time in the 27-year history of the City of Asbury Park Polar Bear Races, Nolan ran home a winner yesterday, covering a five-mile, five-lap boardwalk course in 26 minutes, 36.6 seconds.

In the long run, there has never been a distanceman as consistently excellent as Nolan, a 43-year-old Middletown Township resident, in this state

He was there - as a Middletown High School student - when the Polar Bear Races began, back in 1964. And 24 times out of 27, he has placed in the top three. In addition to his eight firsts, he's registered nine seconds and seven

Over the years, the list of Polar Bear stars has included such "name" runners as Marty Liquori, Bill Reilly, Vince Cartier, Joe Lynch and John McDonnell.

Most have long since dropped out of serious running, but Nolan keeps right on racing to the front of the pack.

Nolan gave a typical performance yesterday - bolting ahead of the 165runner field in the first few strides; and staying in front all the way.

The only real suspense came in the battle for second place. Hoyle Mozee of Long Branch, another long-run Shore veteran, eventually nabbed the second spot by outkicking Kevin Sommer of Howell Township and Jackson Memorial High School freshman "pheenom" Rich Morris. The 1989 Polar Bear champion, Lou Zimmerman of Neptune, ran fifth in this one.

While Nolan has dominated the Polar Bear men's division, there has been no dominating runner in the women's division, which began in 1969. Mary Gilligan of Highlands was yesterday's winner in 33:36, becoming the eighth different winner in the last nine years, the 16th in 22 years.



ASBURY PARK - Bring on the new year, road racers Jeremy Stratton and Megan Smith are ready for big

They marked the end of the state's 1994 road racing season with victories Saturday in the 31st annual Polar Bear Races, staging their own New Year's Eve celebration 11 hours early.

Stratton, of Sayreville, ran off with the men's five-mile title in 25:27 and Smith, a Lafavette College sophomore from Middletown Township, took the women's five-mile crown in 31:56.

The co-featured 10-mile race walk produced the closest finish in Polar Bear annals, with Asbury Park's Curt Sheller edging Wall Township's Jack Lach by a stride, 1:32:42 to 1:32:43.

Stratton, Smith and Sheller were first-time Polar Bear champions but women's 10-mile walk champion Pat Weir of Wall Township made it a threepeat, breezing home in 1:35:29 and extending her winning streak, which began in 1992.

Nolan captures Polar Bear run

t took just over 27 minutes for-Harold Nolan to turn back the clock one more time.

The 49-year-old Middletown Township marvel showed his heels to a pack of over 200 pursuers - the majority far younger - to win the 33rd annual Polar Bear Five-Mile Run Sunday in 27 minutes, 8.9 seconds.

Nolan, one of the nation's top Masters Division runners, will be 50 on March 22 but shows no sign of slowing down. This was his ninth career Polar Bear title and an astounding 30th consecutive placing in the top three. He's competed in every Polar Bear race since the first one in 1964 and has 11 second places and 10 thirds on top of his nine firsts.

"This is hard to believe," Nolan said, after catching his breath. "I was just hoping to finish in the top three, to keep my streak going. Chris (runner-up Christopher Stripto) was there with me, the whole way. At 31/2 miles, I slowed down some but he (Stripto) didn't respond."

And the race was decided then and there.

Stripto, the 19-year-old Brookdale Community College freshman from Middletown Township, held on for

sponsored by Oxford Health Plan, attracted athletes from nine states plus Canada. Once held on the boardwalk, the races are now staged on a Lake Avenue course.

Wherever they're run, though, Nolan remains the Polar Bear races' greatest fixture. His previous Polar Bear triumphs came in 1972, '73, '79, 83, '84, '85, '88 and '90.

"With all the young guys around, I didn't think I had much of a chance,' Nolan said.

But youth was neutralized by Nolan's speed and experience. A stickler for speed-building "interval" training on the track, Nolan had the big lift when he needed it most.

Happy with his 30:02 performance in ninth place was Long Islander Maury Dean. But the 54-year-old Patchogue resident has no illusions about staying on top of the 50-54 age division, either.

"Soon as Harry (Nolan) turns 50, it's over," Dean said.

Two weeks after gaining All-America status in the USA Track and Field Junior Olympic Cross Country Championships in Lexington, Ky., 10-year-old Leisha Jackucewicz of Howell Township placed seventh in

Pilla steps out to win 34th Polar Bear race

e was a tower of strength for the University of Notre Dame cross country and track teams last year. It was no surprise that Jim Pilla overpowered the field to win the men's 5-mile title in the 34th Asbury Park Polar Bear Races Dec. 28 along the Lake Avenue course.

The Mater Dei High School graduate and Middletown Township resident, who'd been the Monmouth County and New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association Parochial B state cross country champion as a senior. traded strides with Middletown Masters star Harold Nolan through the opening mile of the Polar Bear race, then stepped out on his own and went on to win convincingly in 26:41.5.

The women's crown in the Polar Bear event, staged by Shore Athletic Club and sponsored by Ox-

ford Health Plans, went to Edison Township's Ilona Bella in 31:23.

Polar Bear original and ninetime winner Nolan settled for second place in 27:22.1, but kept alive one of the state's most incredible records.

In his 34 Polar Bear starts. Nolan has been in the top three 31 times. His top-three streak dates back to 1967.

"Jim's obviously in better shape than he was last year," said Nolan. "He's a top quality runner."

Nolan had won the 1996 Polar Bear crown in 26:52 when Pilla placed third.

"If I can accomplish half the things he's (Nolan) done in his career, I'd be very happy," said Pilla, one of the Irish's emerging distance stars, along with teammate Ryan Blaney, a graduate of Monsignor Donovan High School.

Pilla was a model of consistency, running a 5:15 opening mile, and reeling off 5:20's the rest of the

"It's a fun course, and this was a good, fast run for me," said Pilla.

Mike Houlihan, a former Pilla teammate at Mater Dei and now at Brookdale Community College, snared third in 27:47, with Richie Broxmeyer of Milltown, one of the state's most determined and prolific runners, fourth in 27:50, completing his 100th race of the year.

For Polar Bear 10-mile men's racewalk champion Dave Romansky, this was an emotional jaunt down memory lane. When this 1968 USA 50K Olympian and former national champion at a variety of distances crossed the finish line in 1:27:59, it marked his first Polar Bear victory since 1969.

Now leaner than he's been in years, Romansky, 59, won easily over Jack Lach (1:32:27) and Tom Quattrocchi (1:35:08). Sandy Rubel, Ocean Township, led the women 10-mile walkers in 1:56:15.

Clark, Jackucewicz roar to victory at annual Polar Bear Races

effrey Clark's running career is full of promise. At 18. the Manhattan College freshman from Bogota is already making his mark as a distanceman and outrunning many of his elders.

Clark made his first appearance in the Asbury Park Polar Bear five-mile race a winning one Sunday as he dashed away from a field of 185 to take the traditional holiday event in 27:31.

The 35th annual Polar Bear race, the state's longest running holiday event, was held over a revised mile-and-a-quarter loop along Ocean Avenue and Clark kept close company with Middletown's Christopher Stripto and Harold Nolan and Elmwood Park's Rick Pingitore through the early stages, before setting out on his own.

Youth was definitely served as both Clark and 12-year-old Leisha Jackucewicz of Howell, who took the women's race in 32:51 became the youngest winners in Polar Bear five-mile

After the initial suspense, there was no doubt about Clark's superiority over the second half of the race. He won it going away as 1996 Polar Bear runner-up Stripto took another second place and fought off Nolan for third.

"A lot of great runners have been in this race over the years; I was just glad to be part of it," said Clark, whose winning margin was 200 yards, lapping many runners and barreling on home.

Stripto will brush up on his speed work this winter season and then hopes to run a spring marathon race, hopefully posting a qualifying time for the year 2000 Boston Marathon.

The remarkable Nolan, 51, has run all 35 editions of the Polar Bear and has placed in the top four for \$2 consecutive

"This race has some amazing history to it," said Nolan: "You can think back to all the outstanding people who've been here in the past (such names as Marty Liquori, Bill Reilly. Joe Lynch, John McDonnell, Vince Cartier and Buck Logan) and I'm just happy that the people behind it (Shore Athletic Club volunteers, the Oxford Health Plans sponsors and the City of Asbury Park) keep it going.

"I'm just hoping it's here for many years to come, and that

I'm still part of it for a long time ahead."

At 12, Jackucewicz is one of the finest prospects her age in America and three weeks ago was a key member of the Shore AC team that won the National AAU Junior Olympic midget division girls cross country team championship in Knoxville,

As promising as they come, too, is her eight-year-old sister, Briana, who placed third Sunday, with only Meg Phillips of Spring Lake Heights between the sibling sensations.

Aiming to make his mark on the national level, too, is John Southeck of Litte Silver who took the men's Polar Bear 10-mile race walking crown in a snappy 1:19:48

"I didn't really feel 'on' today, but that still was a five-second PR (personal record) for me," said Soucheck.

"The race was like a time trial for me and I'm never good at time trials."

In February, Soucheck flies to the USA National 50K championship race in Sacramento and hopes to post a qualifying time of 4:80 or better that moves into a qualifying spot for the 1999 World Cup team bound for France. Former national champion Maryanne Torrellas of Clinton, Conn., breezed to the women's 10-mile walk title in 1:33:28, Atlantic Highlands' Tom Quattrocchi nosed out Matawan's Manny Eisner for men's walker-up honors.

Again, the Polar Bear race was billed as "the last race of the year." The 36th Asbury Park Polar Bear event — tentatively Dec. 26, 1999 - will also be one of the last races of the millennium.

ASBURY PARK - Scott Clayton had been running up a storm all last fall, trading strides with much of the nation's best young talent through the collegiate cross country

The University of Pennsylvania senior, out of Pinelands Regional High School, had placed fifth in the IC4A Championships at New York's Van Cortlandt Park, third in the NCAA Mid-Atlantic Regionals at Lehigh, and 69th in the NCAA Championship Finals at Bloomington, Ind. And the 21-year-old Tuckerton resident continued on his hot streak by racing off with the men's title in the 36th annual Asbury Park Polar Bear Five-Mile Run

The traditional event, sponsored by Oxford Health Plans and staged by Shore Athletic Club volunteers in cooperation with the City of Asbury Park, attracted a field of 170, gathered from nine Eastern Seaboard states

Clayton, who was prodded out of bed and invited to run the race by friends just two hours before the start, broke out fast, grabbed the early lead and was never seriously challenged. He went on to a 27:03.4 triumph in the event staged around a new Sunset Park course and billed as 'the last race of the millennium."

While Clayton is heading into the homestretch of his collegiate career, women's division winner Briana Jackucewicz, of Howell, is just a grade-schooler. The nine-year-old, fresh from strong performances in both the USA Track and Field and AAU Junior Olympic cross country finals, led the Polar Bear women's field in 33:46. Her older sister, Leisha, had won the Polar Bear crown in 1998.

Sharing the spotlight with Clayton and Jackucewicz were Polar Bear 10-mile race walking winners John Soucheck, of Little Silver, and Sherry Brosnahan, of Bridgewater, both members of host Shore AC.

Soucheck, warming up for the USA Olympic Trial 50K racewalk Feb. 13 in Sacramento, Calif., repeated as Polar Bear walk champion with a one-hour, 23-minute, 18-second performance, with Long Islander Heber Ramos of New York's East Side Track Club his closest rival in 1:28:55.

Brosnahan, who has set eight U.S. women's Masters records this year, walked to the women's 10-mile crown in 1:37:19.

Shore AC veterans Bill Scholl and Harold Nolan were the closest threats to Clayton in the five-miler. Neptune's Scholl, 48, the former Jersey Shore Marathon champion in Asbury Park, claimed second in 28:13 with Middletown's Nolan third in 28:24.

About 250 take part in the 38th annual Polar Bear event

About 50 walkers kicked off the day at 10 a.m., participating in either the 10-mile race or a five-mile health walk. Then, at 1 p.m., about 195 runners did a five-mile run.

The Polar Bear events were held on city streets with the start and finish lines at Convention Hall. Since its inception in 1964,

Ocean Township resident dominated the 40th Asbury Park Polar Bear five-mile run.

ric Savoth has what it takes to rank right up here with Amerid ca's brightest young middle distance runners.

The 25-year-old Ocean Township resident, a graduate of Christian Brothers Academy and Georgetown University, put his talent on display in the 40th annual Asbury Park Polar Bear five-mile run, cruising to an overwhelming 24-minute, 53-second triumph in the Dec. 28 holiday event staged by Shore Athletic Club and sponsored by Oxford Health Plans in cooperation with the City of Asbury Park.

The 40th Polar Bear run attracted a strong field of 225 that included an array of other leading prospects for future stardom. Many of the state's best runners had appeared in the Polar Bear race over its previous 39 years and Savoth's 24:53 performance moved him into a tie for seventh place on the alltime Polar Bear performance list, a lineup still topped by ex-Seton Hall star Ray Cerankowski's 24:35 in 1977.

Now - as Savoth heads back to California, where he trains with and competes for the powerful Nike Farm Team club in the Palo Alto area - his biggest job may be to stay injury-free for the full campaign leading up to the USA Olympic Trials in Sacramento in July.

When he's clear of running-related foot problems, Savoth keeps proving he could be a contender in the Olympic Trials 5,000-meter race. At Georgetown, he won a pair of IC4A outdoor 5.000-meter crowns. Running for the Nike Farm Team, he placed fifth in the 3,000 meters at the USATF Indoor National Championships last March in Bosion. But he's yet to be able to train through a complete season at full tilt staying injury-free.

-Savoth completely outclassed the Asbury Park Polar Bear field, bolting to an early lead and finishing 1:59 in front of runner-up Matt Kootman of Middletown, he former Boston College star, who ran 16:52. Dickson Mercer of Fair Haven, a op runner at Gettysburg College, plaimed third in 27:19, ahead of Marion's Kevin Hurley (27:41), the 2002 Polar lear champion for University of Mary.

Espinosa puts finishing kick for the win

The Asbury Park Polar Bear Races, first staged on the Asbury Park boardwalk in 1964, continue to make history.

For the 21st straight year, the Polar Bear Races — staged by Shore Athletic Club and sponsored by Oxford Health Plans produced a new men's five-mile run champion.

It was Pedro Espinosa, 23, of Freehold first over the line on the city's boards the afternoon of Dec. 30, as he unleashed a powerful finishing kick to win in 26 minutes and 21 seconds, just ahead of Fair Haven's Dickson Mercer, who had led most of the way but settled for second in 26:24. Toms River High School East star Neil Sheridan took third in 28:11.

Asbury Park's Joe Pawlish was fourth in 28.36.

"Every time I start, I try to do the best I can," said Espinosa, who won the Reindeer Romp 5K earlier this month in Point Pleasant Beach. "When I finished and saw my time, I felt very happy."

Not since Harold Nolan of Middletown won in 1985, repeating his victory of 1984, has a Polar Bear men's five-mile winner emerged in consecutive years.

Nolan, 59, and a nine-time winner, continues to rank as the Polar Bear event's most enduring participant. He ran his 43rd consecutive Polar Bear race in 31:38, placing 18th as second finisher over 50 in the field of 240.

It was a completely different story, though, in the women's division of the five-miler, as well as the co-featured 10-mile racewalk. Peddie School senior ant (32:10) and Lauren Rhatigan of Ship Bottom (33:04).

For the third straight year, and ninth time in 11 years, John Soucheck of Little Silver reigned as Polar Bear 10-mile walking champion. He won it in 1:21:44 but this was a result that had a twist.

Rich Luettchau, a Richard Stockton College senior, actually walked the 10-miler faster than Soucheck, clocking a 1:18:33. Only trouble, though, was that he arrived late for the start and spotted Soucheck a 5:43 lead before taking chase.

Spotswood resident Tom Quattrocchi was third in 1:37.04.

The women's 10-mile walk, however, produced a new winner in Lisa-Marie Vellucci of Staten Island, N.Y., who walked the boards in 1:33:50.

Closest to her were Maria Paul of Long Branch (1:49.56) and Fran Emanuel of Brick (1:57.18).

More than 100 participate in Shore Athletic Club's 47th event

ASBURY PARK — In 47 years, the Shore Athletic Club of New Jersey has never canceled its Polar Bear Races.

So for a little thing like snow — even a predicted 16 or more inches — organizers were not about to call off Sunday's post-Christmas race along the city boardwalk.

"This was not the worst year," Harry Nolan, who has competed in every Polar Bear Race since it began, told a hardy crowd of runners and fans who stuck around for a postrace awards ceremony at the Grand Arcade.

Believed to be the oldest five-mile run in the nation, the Shore Athletic Club's annual Polar Bear Race is a tradition for many area runners. The race was preceded Sunday by a 10-mile walk won by 24-year-old Andres Chocho of Ecuador, who completed the walk in one hour, 35 minutes and one second.

Nolan, 63, of Middletown, has run in the Polar Bear Race when the temperature was 5 below zero and when the race course was "pure ice." Even so, he considered skipping this year's race when he saw the snow start to fall.

"Any other race, I'd probably go back to bed," he said.

But Nolan did show up, one of 117 runners who finished the Polar Bear Race, which was cut to three miles this year because of the weather. Many of the competitors were bundled up in sweat pants and jackets to ward off the sleeting snow and chilly temperatures.

"It was intense," said Howell native Joe Rooney, the first to cross the finish line at 18 minutes, 33 seconds. Rooney, a triathlete, guessed he has run in the Polar Bear Race four times. This year, he said, "it was kind of rough. But there was a lot of energy out there."

The first female to complete the race was Allison Linnell of Colts Neck, who runs for University of Washington's cross-country team.

Linnell, 20, clocked in at 18 minutes, 54 seconds.

Ice formed on her eyelashes as she ran and could barely see, Linnell said after the race. But, she said, "it was fun. . . . Definitely makes you tougher."

Runners probably got a boost from the sight and sounds of Dave DeMonico, a fixture at the Polar Bear Races for years now.

The Ocean Township resident was out there on the boards once again this year, wearing his trademark Santa suit and playing tunes on his trumpet for the competitors.

"It's fun. People seem to like it," said DeMonico, 43.

For the 48th consecutive year, Nolan played a prominent role in the Polar Bear action.

Nolan was there on the starting line when the first Polar Bear Run was staged in 1964 -this was a race won by John McDonnell, who went on to recognition at Arkansas as one of the most successful coaches in American collegiate track and cross country history -and Nolan was back on the starting line for this one, earning rounds of applause from his fellow runners.

"This is an incredible tradition and I think it's just great to see it going so strongly after all these years; I'm always happy to be a part of it," said Nolan, who'd won it nine times in past years and won the men's 60-69 divisional title in this one.

In addition to Nolan's role as a racer, he is the Polar Bear event's official historian. And his archives remind us that the five-mile event records are Ray Cerankowski's 24:35 in 1982, for men, and Alicia Kelly's 28:27 in 1995, for women.

ASBURY PARK — First staged in 1964, and ever since on the last weekend of the year, the Asbury Park Polar Bear Races have dealf with an array of weather situations — everything from blizzards to driving rainstorms to temperatures just above zero and, yes, to temps well into the 60s.

So the racers — both runners and racewalkers in this event that now ranks as one of the nation's longest running holiday competitions — have learned to be prepared for whatever the meteorological gods have chosen to dish out.

History was again served on Sunday, as over 250 took part in the co-featured 5-mile run and 10-mile racewalk, slogging it out over the city's boardwalk and roadways despite the steady rain, cold and generally challenging conditions.

"You guys were awesome," S-mile run director Shannon Gillespie told the competitors at the post-race awards cer-

Specially so were the winners — men's champion Andrew Brodeur of Bethesda, Md. (25:13:67) and women's winner Caitlin Dorgan of Red Bank (30:33:62) in the 5-mile run, and 10-mile racewalk leaders John Soucheck of Little Silver (1:36:29) and Maria Paul of Long Branch (1:58:07.)

They toughed it out in true Polar Bear tradition. Brodeur, the former

Brick Memorial High School and Duke University star now teaching school, repeated his 2012 victory, when the course was shortened to 5 kilometers (3.1 miles) in the aftermath of superstorm Sandy conditions. And it was a perfect warmup for the Shore AC member's next hig start — he's headed to the High Mountain 10K in Mandeville, Jamaica, as its defending champion on Jan 26.

"I'm sure the weather will be a little different down there than it was in Asbury Park," said Brodeur, 23, chilled but smiling as he downed a cup of hot bean and bacon soup provided all the racers by McLoone's Asbury Grille.

Dorgan, 25, placed ninth overall as she outran Amanda Tripoli of Englishtown (31:43.36) for the women's title.

But the loudest applause of the day was reserved for Harold Nolan of Middletown, "the original Polar Bear," as he finished 27th in 33:40:36. He ran his first Polar Bear race as a Middletown High School student in 1964 and has been here every year since — sometimes coming back from Utah, Nebraska and New Hampshire to compete. A nine time winner, he's still at the top of his game at age 66.

"This actually was one of my best races in quite a while," said Nolan. "I'm over the injuries and running well again Of course, you know I wouldn't miss this race no matter what.

"The weather? If you're a true Polar Bear, you learn to deal with whatever you get."

Once again, some Polar Bears took it another step — by taking a postrace dip in the frigid Atlantic Ocean.

"It's not as bad as it looked; it's just psychological," said Polar Bear Dave DeMonico of Ocean Township, who saw triple duty as the race's designated Santa Claus, and leading the runners in a spirited pre-race singing of the National Anthem.

"This race is never easy," said Soucheck, a frequent Polar Bear race walk winner over the years. "And this year was one of the foughest. But it wouldn't be the Polar Bear if people weren't talking about the weather."

The races were once again hosted by Shore AC volunteers and friends, and staged in cooperation with City of Asbury Park officials and the support of local merchants. A post-race awards ceremony was held at the Berkeley Ocean runt Hotel.

56th ANNUAL ASBURY PARK POLAR BEAR RACES ATTRACTS A RECORD NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS

The 56th Annual Asbury Park Polar Bear Races attracted a record number of participants at the 2019 edition of the event. Over 500 athletes turned out on a perfect fifty degree day to run in both the 5000 meter run and 5000 meter Racewalk. The traditional end of the year event was held on December 28th, and again was conducted by the Shore Athletic Club, who began the event in 1964. The races have been conducted both on and off the boardwalk for the entire fifty-six years of its existence. While it has never been cancelled, athletes over the years have run in snow storms, icy roads, gale winds and sub-freezing temperatures.

Leading the way this year were the Scheid brothers, Jeremy (15:31) and Justin (15:33), who were one hundred yards clear of third place finisher Mark Sidebottom, who clocked in with A 15:52. On the women's side, it was Kerry Dyke covering the Asbury boardwalk course in 17:35. Polar Bear race coordinator Erin O'Neil performed double duty finishing a solid second in 19:50.72, with Linda Spooner, a Massachusetts resident finished third in 20:47.72. The finishing time by the Scheid's moved them to the fourth and fifth fastest all-time 5k finishers in the men's race. Former U.S. Olympian Marty Liquori set the record of 15:23 in 1975, while Shore A.C. member Amanda Marino is the women's record holder with a 17:41 run in 2016. Running in the race again this year was 72 year old Dr. Harry Nolan. Nolan has run in every one of the 56 polar bear races since his days at Middletown (North) high school, and remains the third fastest polar bear runner ever.



The 5k Racewalk saw newcomer Tim Chelius out walk the field finishing with a 31:35.44, out racing Fred Linkhard (32:57.51) and Ray Robertson (36:57.21) in the men's division. Lori Schoch not only won the women's division race, was but second overall in the race. She crossed the line in 32:40.57, out pacing Monica Loperena (42:40.63) and Paloma Loperena (42:48.80). Watching the walkers keenly was 85 year old Elliott Denman, a 1956 U.S. Olympian in the 50k Racewalk. Denman began the Polar Bear races in 1964, and has only missed one time in officiating the event over the years.

The event was supported by a number of volunteers from Red Bank Regional and Manalapan High School, and the Gone Running Athletes. Additional support was provided by a number of donors who contributed to this year's Polar Bear event.

KUS, O'NEILL WIN 57TH ANNUAL ASBURY PARK POLAR BEAR 5K RACE



Nolan Kus, a freshman student at Quinnipiac University won the 5k race at the 57th running of the annual Asbury Park Polar Bear Carnival on December 27, 2020. Taking the lead from the start, Kus built up twenty-yard gap over second place runner Dan Campbell of Middletown to win in 19:21. Campbell was clocked in a close 19:32, while it was new comer Christian Politan taking third place in the men's division in 21:51. Erin O'Neill ran off with the women's title in a quick 20:09, with Liz Geiger (26:36) and Leslie Nowicki (26:39) capturing the second and third spots. The race once again was held on the Asbury Park Boardwalk, with runners traveling from Convention Hall out to Ocean Grove and back over a two-loop course.



The Polar Bear Carnival event is the oldest road race within the shore region, and one of the oldest in New Jersey. It was first organized in 1964 by former Asbury Park Press sport's writer and 1956 Olympian Elliott Denman. Denman was on hand once again this year to help with the race administration. While the program of races has changed in distance over the years, and the actual course has varied due to weather conditions and construction on the Asbury Park Boardwalk, this year's race took on a different tone of its own. Limited in the number participants that were allowed to gather for outside events to twenty-five people due to state COVID-19 restrictions, the race became an invitational event of mostly club members and past winners of the race. Thus, the race once again maintained its reputation as an event which has never been cancelled for any reason.

Among the participants this year were former 1974 winner Phil Hinck and Shore A.C.'s Dr. Harry Nolan, who has won nine of the races over the years between 1972 to 1996. Nolan has also run in every one of the Polar Bear races going back to his high school days at Middletown (North) High School. Also helping Denman in the race management was Shore A.C. President Walter MacGowan handling the administration and longtime club member John Kuhi serving a Chief Timer. The number of runners this year was a far cry from the 2019 event which saw over five hundred athletes take part. The 2021 race is scheduled

PEDERSEN, DYKE RUN TO VICTORIES AT 58TH ANNUAL ASBURY PARK POLAR BEAR RACES ON BOARDWALK; PAUL AND LOGAN LEAD RACEWALKERS.

ASBURY PARK - The Asbury Park Polar Bear Races - held to a limited few participants by the Covid pandemic raging at Holiday Time 2020 - were back at virtually full strength for their 58th annual edition on Sunday morning, December 26th, 2021.

That was the very good news delivered at the Day-After-Christmas special, the gala event whose history dates back to 1964, which attracted nearly 300 participants and crowds of onlookers to the Asbury Park boardwalk. All the racers were sent on their way by the honorary starter, Asbury Park councilwoman Eileen Chapman.

The featured 5K race winners were a coast-to-coast combination.

As Robert Pedersen Jr. of Santa Rosa, California was racing to a men's 5K triumph in the Polar Bear record-time of 15:14.18, Perth Amboy resident Kerry Dyke, a star member host Shore Athletic Club's women's distance racing team, was leading the women's division in 18:49, quick but not up to her own Polar Bear-record pace of 17:35, dating to 2019.

Pedersen did something very special - cracking the Polar Bear 5K record of 15:23 set by the famed Marty Liquori 46 years ago.

It was the remarkable Liquori, then of Cedar Grove, whose brilliant career started at Essex High School in Newark and continued on at Villanova University, and reached

Recent Monmouth University star Kyle Mueller ran second in 15:45.27, with Middletown brothers Brian (15:45.30) and Kyle Hill (15:46.44), both former Christian Brothers Academy stars, in 3-4.

Completing the top five was Kyle Spector of Manalapan (16:02.04), now excelling at

Just one Polar Bear runner has been at the event for all 58 years - and that is Middletown's Harold Nolan, a member of both the Shore Athletic Club and National Masters Halls of Fame. A nine-time Polar Bear champion over the years, Nolan continues in excellent form. He was clocked in at 25:55.47 in 93rd place, and second spot just nine seconds back of Monmouth Beach's Mike Washakowski atop the men's 70-74 division.

Nolan was given special recognition at the start of the race by Shore AC president Walter MacGowan, whe was serving as meet announcer.

"Thanks for the personal mention of my 58 years," said Nolan.

"Good job on (organizing) the Polar Bear," Nolan told event director Erin O'Neill. "It was nice to see a big turnout: it was a good day for racing."



RAFFERTY AND HUNEKE TAKE HONORS IN THE 59TH ANNUAL POLAR BEAR CARNAVAL 5K

Ryan Rafferty and Amanda Huneke took the men's and women's crowns in the 59th edition of the Asbury Park Carnaval 5k run on December 31. Rafferty went right to the lead at the start of the race with runners Justin Scheid and Riley Maher hot on his heals. At the midway point all three were close together, but Rafferty pulled away on the return trip to Asbury Park's Convention Hall to break the tape in a fast 15:47.92. That time placed Rafferty as the 11th fastest runner in the history of the event. Scheid, a two time winner of the event landed a close second in 15:53.28, while Maher clocked in with a 16:08.89.

Amanda Huneke established a strong lead throughout the race, finishing in a fast 18:26.44, but well off the record of 17:35 set by Kerry Dyke in 2019. Runners Erika Flores and Casey Hopkins battled it out for most of the race, with Flores pulling away to land second in 18:42.75, with Casey taking third in 18:51.21. Over 300 runners and walkers entered the event this year. The Polar Bear races were again conducted by the Shore Athletic Club, under the direction of Erin O'Neil, a former winner of the women's race, assisted by Coach Joe Compagni. Running in 59th edition of the race was Dr. Harry Nolan, who has not missed running in any of the Polar Bear races over the years, having won the event nine times.

Many who attended the awards ceremony were privileged to hear Shore A.C. member Bob Bazley read a Congressional Presentation awarded to Elliott Denman, the founder of the Polar Bear races, as well as founder and long time President of the Shore A.C., and a 1956 Olympian. Denman could not be present at the event for the first time due to illness, but there was much clapping after the award reading as well as from tributes by club President Walter MacGowan and other club members.
